3<sup>rd</sup> and G Streets, NW, Washington, D.C.**

**Delegated Action of the Executive Director**

March 31, 2005

Pursuant to delegations of authority adopted by the Commission on October 3, 1996, I approve the preliminary and final site and building plans for a guard booth at the Federal Bureau of Investigation's (FBI) Washington Field Office, 3<sup>rd</sup> and G Streets, NW, Washington, D.C., as shown on NCPC Map File No. 1.22(38.40)41475.

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The General Services Administration (GSA) has submitted a proposal to construct a guard booth at the FBI's Washington Field Office at 3<sup>rd</sup> and G Streets, NW. The field office is bounded on the north by G Street, on the south by F Street, on the east by 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, and on the west by 4<sup>th</sup> Street. The National Building Museum is located immediately to the west and the 3<sup>rd</sup> Street tunnel is located immediately to the east. GSA advises that the north garage entrance is now being more extensively used and FBI security protocols require that a security checkpoint be conducted prior to entering the building by vehicles. The proposed guard booth would be located adjacent to the north garage entrance driveway, attached to the building, and confined within the building's property line. It would not intrude into the public sidewalk right-of-way. The guard booth would use some of the stone of the existing planter as well as match the building materials and the existing guard booth at the garage entrance at 3<sup>rd</sup> and F Streets.

The proposal was reviewed by the Coordinating Committee at its March 16<sup>th</sup> meeting. GSA advises that pursuant to the National Environmental Policy Act, the project was determined a Categorical Exclusion. GSA further advises that the proposal is not subject to Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, as amended.
