RENEWAL OF ANTENNA APPROVAL (BUILDING L04)  
7323 Telegraph Road, Alexandria, Virginia**

**Delegated Action of the Executive Director**

March 30, 2007

Pursuant to delegations of authority under Section 6(B) of Guidelines and Submission Requirements for Antennas on Federal Property, as approved by the Commission on January 7, 1988 and amended on August 2, 2001, I approve the renewal of approval for one existing antenna at the U.S. Coast Guard Telecommunications and Information Systems Command (TISCOM) at 7323 Telegraph Road, in Alexandria, Virginia, as shown on NCPC Map File No. 2204.21(38.30)40426 for a period not to exceed five years.

The United States Coast Guard (USCG) is seeking renewal of approval for one antenna located at the U.S. Coast Guard Telecommunications and Information Systems Command (TISCOM) at 7323 Telegraph Road in Alexandria, Virginia. The Commission previously reviewed and approved the antenna on September 4, 1997 for a period not to exceed five years. The existing installation consists of an INMARSAT Standard B radome with enclosed dish antenna installed on a 20-foot-high tower adjacent to the west side of Building L04. A 16-foot ground-mounted whip antenna northeast of the building existed at the time and remains in operation.

The USCG indicates that with the exception of removal of a second ground-mounted 24-foot whip antenna southeast of Building L04, there have been no other changes in any previous conditions of the initial construction, operation, maintenance, or RF radiation of the antenna as previously approved. In compliance with the Commission's Environmental and Historic Preservation Policies and Procedures, NCPC staff has determined that the action is a categorical exclusion under the National Environmental Policy Act in conformance with NCPC requirements under §8(C)(20) that provides for the review and approval of the installation of communication antenna on federal property. USCG has determined that the project will have no effect on historic resources. NCPC staff has determined to permit a five-year approval, as previously approved.
